## Responses to consultation

This section summarises the response to the consultation and sets out the Government's response.

Respondents had no substantive comments on the draft regulations although the Association of Pension Lawyers did provide an opinion that the draft regulations would carry out their intended purpose and that they will align the proposed Scottish parliamentary arrangements with those already effective at Westminster. Therefore, the regulations will be laid before Parliament without delay and with no substantive change from the drafts published with the consultation. Subject to Parliamentary approval, they will come into force on 1 September 2009.

As these regulations are of a technical nature and necessary as a consequence of the Scottish Parliamentary Pensions Act 2009 to ensure that the Scottish Parliamentary Pension Scheme will operate much as it does under the current transitional legislation, the limited response is not unexpected.
